Strategic Forestry Initiative Agreement #TP20SLM055 between the Minister of Forests, Lands, and Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development and Bonaparte Indian Band signed on November 12, 2019

 ${\it D}$ iscussion on the Bonaparte Custom Code has been postponed until the end of January

On November 12 Chief & Council made Motion 2019-11-12-03 to pay \$7500 towards the Elders: \$5400 for Walmart Gift Cards valued at \$50, and the balance to be used towards the Elder's Christmas Dinner

Alex Fanni, Zach Parker and Marilyn Porter will place an RFP to develop a Traditional Use Study, the funding for this project will come from Enbridge

The General Meeting for Housing was well attended. The next Housing Committee will be on January 27, 2020 at noon, and later that day from 6-8pm. This will be the first reading of the new Bonaparte Housing Policy

ENBRIDGE AGREES IN PRINCIPLE TO FUND TRADITIONAL LAND USE STUDY

In November Community Negotiators Kendall Hunter and Alex Fanni established an agreement in principle with Enbridge to fund a Traditional Land Use Study for the T-South Pipeline that runs through Bonaparte Indian Band territory. For those of you who are unaware, a Traditional Land Use Study (TLUS) is:

"The recording of the lands and resources that a certain Indigenous group has traditionally used for activities like hunting, berry picking, transportation, occupancy, spiritual purposes, etc. Traditional Land Use Studies are sometimes called a Traditional Knowledge Study or a Cultural Resource Inventory."

Moving forward Bonaparte will be tendering a proposal to different companies who specialize in Traditional Land Use Studies. The tender will be a competitive process so that Bonaparte can select a company that maximizes the benefits associated with conducting the study. Typical benefits that arise from Traditional Land Use Studies are honoraria for Elders, a part-time Community Liaison, increased capacity for Lands / Title and Rights Departments, arceological work, and wages for land-tour guides.

Bonaparte is currently in the process of shortlisting companies to take part in the competitive tender process. The goal is to have a company selected, and a proposal sent to Enbridge in January 2020. Following the completion of the research, the Traditional Land Use Study will form that basis for future negotiations and potential accommodations from Enbridge based on the impact of its operations on Bonaparte.

OCTOBER 24TH COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT SESSION OVERVIEW BONAPARTE ADULT EDUCATION CENTER

Summary:

The BIB Education Department is working toward developing an Adult Education Center that will be built in Bonaparte to serve Bonaparte members as well as local First Nations and Municipalities. Cara Basil has been contracted to complete the Business Plan. The purpose of this community engagement session was to ensure the Business Plan would have feedback from Bonaparte members and the process would continue to be community-driven.

Feedback:

The meeting was an open discussion and the following was identified from participants.

Important Considerations:

- Technology and climate change: review BC Clean Jobs
- Needs of all age groups
- Industry and Market Demands
- External projects and initiatives that may have similarities
- Needs of each student that are not solely academic: childcare, housing, counselling, mentorship, thorough engagement
- Current issues such as title and rights
- Placement of Education Center and adequate capacity
- Creating job opportunities within the Center for BIB members
- Securing funding from external sources that will be long-

Goals and Objectives Identified:

- Deliver engaging and fully accredited programs that will provide long-term and sustainable job opportunities
 - Develop curriculum that is rooted in culture and values.
 - Identify current market trends and industry demands.
 - Include practicum and co-op placements into program models.
 - Create Work-Force Development plan.
- Provide open and accessible post-secondary learning opportunities to all students.
 - Provide assessment tests for program placements.
 - Develop "Post-Secondary Readiness" program.
 - Provide tutoring and mentorship supports.
- Support every student holistically to ensure individual success
 - Develop Academic and Wellness Advisor position.
 - Identify support methods for students with children, barriers, and trauma.
 - Develop community-based teaching model focused in intergenerational teaching, elder mentorship, and on-the-land learning.
- Engage in meaningful partnerships that will support community-driven learning and longevity.
 - Meet with other First Nation communities for input and support.
 - Identify external funding opportunities for capital, programs, and ongoing expenses.
 - Develop policies and procedures that will include a committee for decision-making processes.
 - Conduct annual analysis of learning and employment needs.

Next Steps:

- 1. Identify possible construction sites for Education Center
- 2. Work with Bonaparte Lands Committee/Department to determine placement
- 3. Community Engagement Session #2 to review final Business Plan and provide further feedback. Date to be determined.
- 4. Develop community committee to support the ongoing needs of project


 Decrease dependence of members on BIB to provide maintenance & renovations –shift more responsibility to members

Bonaparte Indian Band will develop a three-stage approach:

- Consult, inform and educate the message of the cost of housing and promote sustainable housing. –
 Community engagement, and information sessions;
- 2. Implement and enforce sustainable housing approach (housing policy); and
- 3. Continue to monitor stage 2 and make adjustments

The Bonaparte Indian Band community hall is almost completed and yes it is taking lots of time but the quality of work and the outcome is worth the wait. We now have a functional community hall to use for the time being until we can get a new gym or community center. We are happy with the results and that the community now has a hall they can be proud of.

We're happy to have band members coming back to the community and moving to the subdivision. These band members are getting their own financing and are able to build/set a modular in the new subdivision.

Neal Antoine's home is getting close to completion. There were many issues to begin with but things are moving along. We are happy that their home is near completion and will be ready for the winter months. Marie Antoine's home was delivered in early November and is currently being set up to standards with the help of her family. We would like to thank Tracey Antoine for taking the lead on this project and helping Marie get the items she requested in her new home. Thankful to have our elder settled and ready for the winter months.

Nathan Perry has also been approved for a replacement home. His home burned down and has been at a standstill for a long time. We visited with him in early November and he picked out his new home to be brought back to his property by the ball field. He is very excited to move back to the community and work on his crafts.

There are many housing issues brought forward on a daily basis and we are trying hard to keep up on all of them. We are moving forward with renovations and repairs in the community and thank everyone for their patience and understanding.
