AROUND THE COMMUNITY

COMMUNITY NEGOTIATOR UPDATES WITH ENBRIDGE

Bonaparte Indian Band's Community Negotiator team had another busy month moving forward with Enbridge engagement last month. First, on October 10, 2019, Kendall Antoine-Hunter and Alex Fanni (BIB Community Negotiator Team) provided community members an update at the AGM. The evening event went well as membership, elders, and leadership had an open discussion on the challenges and opportunities present as BIB engages Enbridge. Overall, the message from Chief Porter and Council was positive. It was stated on numerous occasions that the administrative issues that have held Bonaparte back over the last year have been resolved and this Council has brought on qualified professionals and Band members to move the Nation's agenda forward.

Next, Kendall and Alex had their first face to face meeting with Enbridge on October 23, 2019, in Savona. The meeting was cordial as each a party laid out their priorities for future engagement.

Accordingly, the following is an overview of the major October highlights from the Community Negotiator Team:

- 1. The Canadian Energy Regulator approved Enbridge's T-South Expansion in September 2019 with conditions. Enbridge is still required to engage BIB throughout the construction phase of this project.
- 2. Community Update on October 10, 2019 by Kendall and Alex.
- 3. Meeting with Enbridge and Community Negotiators on October 23, 2019.
- 4. Workshop planned for 2020 with BIB staff and the Canadian Energy Regulator. The workshop will inform BIB how they can better engage the regulator on future projects.
- 5. Community Negotiators will be submitting a funding proposal to Enbridge for a Traditional Land Use Study. This study will include BIB Lands Staff, Title and Rights, and Community members if approved.

Moving forward, Chief and Council will be providing direction to the Community Negotiator Team following the October 23 meeting. Heading into 2020, BIB is in a much better position than it was a year ago to maximise the opportunities from Enbridge's operations in the territory.

BONAPARTE WATER OPERATOR COMMUNITY UPDATE

Bonaparte Water Operator Community Update:

Oct 22, 19 = Bonaparte had their Water System Annual Performance Inspection (API) at our NEW Water Treatment Plant. WSP has been retained by Naut'sa Mawt Tribal Council to undertake the annual inspection, and Lands Manager, Marilyn Porter will receive the results and share.

Bonaparte will be conducting an Evaluation of Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) Water and Wastewater Program(s) on November 12th, 2019. Brian Brauer, Senior Consultant, Ference & Company, will be out to meet with Lands Manager, Marilyn Porter and the 4 Water Operators, Byron Porter, Mike Williams, Julie Zabotel & Brenda Antoine to discuss:

- · Assessments,
- · Training and Capacity Development,
- · Operations and Maintenance,
- Environmental Public Health Division (EPHD) Activities/Monitoring for Potential Drinking Water and Health Issues,
- Relationships
- Program Enhancements

HOW CAN YOU PREVENT BACK FLOW

Backflow can be prevented by using an attachment on your hose or faucet called a backflow-prevention device. The simplest prevention system is an air gap, which is a physical separation between the pipes. A hose bib vacuum breaker installed on the outdoor spigot will also work.

WATERING SAMPLING

The department is still on schedule for required water sampling for First Nations Health Authority (FNHA) but we are waiting for the new Environmental Health Officer (EHO), Rob Flemming, to get his area sorted out and contacts confirmed; at that point the water operators would like Rob to come to BIB to do some training and offer some answers on water sampling results so that we can keep everyone posted on the sample results that are coming in from the ALS Lab in Kamloops.

During any kind of water repairs it is mandatory that a water operator be present to record activities from start to finish of any repair work.

On September 30th, 2019 to October 5th, 2019, Julie Zabotel, Bonaparte Water Operator, went to Carlsbad, California to do a final overview of Morgan's Water Treatment Plant. Allegro One Consulting (Loris Bertoncello), David Nairne and Associates (John Bergese) and Watanabe Engineering (Ted Watanabe) were present at American Membranes Inc. We were able to have a look at the plant and work through some noted items to ensure the unit is ready for installation at the Morgan's Plant. Julie trained with Ted Watanabe and the AMI staff on the HMI screen and how to do wet test on the plant. They also worked through different scenarios in the plant while in operation. These scenarios will assist operators on what to do if anything were to come up in the plant while in operation. Overall the plant looks great and we are eager for the installation of the unit in the community. Some items have been identified to improve the overall unit for the community's operational efforts. Within the next weeks we will find out when the plant can be delivered and put into operation. Looking forward to sharing this educational opportunity with the community and my fellow co-workers.



WOULD YOU BE INTERESTED IN LEARNING MORE ABOUT CULTURAL PRACTICES IN OUR COMMUNITY?

After much discussion and thinking of this for the last couple of years, my niece Bonnie Morgan and I have decided to move beyond the thinking stage.

We are interested is starting a cultural practices dialogue and need mentorship from Elders and Knowledge keepers from Bonaparte and surrounding areas.

Some of our interests are: Who is responsible for giving out traditional names to members in the community? What is required? Where do the names come from? Who is entitled to receive a name? Who are our knowledge keepers? Who knows our songs and stories? Who knows our dance? What is the protocol to making an offering at ceremonies? What are some of the teaching that have been lost with our Youth? What are some of the steps that require to be taken when a community member passes? Some of us need to learn how to present ourselves when we travel afar for events, such as introducing ourselves with our traditional name and a formal introduce in the language. Why were women told to wear a long dress to ceremonies? Was the head scarf part of a traditional practice? Did our ancestors practice the "coming of age" for our youth when they reached a certain age? What is the practice when a hunter goes out to hunt? What offerings do they offer for the wild game? Is there protocol when you introduce yourself to a respectful Elder in community? What is the protocol when a baby is born? Who is entitled to go out into other communities to represent our community? What is the protocol in this? Who determines who the knowledge keepers are in our community?

Bonnie and I will be calling on other Knowledge Keepers in the Secwepemc territory to join us for our first meeting December 1, 2019 (Sunday) at Bonaparte Community Hall at 11:00 am. Light lunch and snacks will be provided. Please feel welcome to attend and provide input to the discussion or contact me on cell 250-318-4508.
